- be about 700 words each
- be written in an informal voice
- be submitted monthly, according to a predetermined schedule
- be subject to editing for grammar, length, and style

Interested writers should be familiar with the TESOL Blog's style before [applying online](#). Required documents include the following and should be added as "Additional Uploads" where there is not a specific place on the application for the item:

- CV or résumé
- brief cover letter
- 10 sample titles (each title should be 60 characters or fewer, including spaces, and should accurately reflect the content of the post)
- one sample posting, with title: An example posting that is representative of your general blog content (700 words or fewer)
- a brief author bio (100 words or fewer) and headshot
